

TO THE HEAVENLY GLORY



Fr Jayin Kalamparambil CMI (1984-2020)

Jayin lived a life to the full. He loved his people and this love was expressed through the language of that people of the land that he fell in love with. He was a Hindi pundit and the flow and the beauty of his literary expressions were captivating. Sometimes, without a prophetic deviation from norms, progress is not possible. Jayin believed in the positive violations of normalcy to explore something new.

Jayin was born on 1 November 1984 in Neeleeswaram in Ernakulam district as the sixth son of Late Mr. Lazer and Mariyam. He has three elder brothers and two elder sisters. He joined the CMI congregation on 26 June 2000 as a candidate. He did his higher secondary education from Casmiya Inter College Najibabad. On 19 March 2005, he made his first

profession at Anudhavana Novitiate house, Mancherial. He completed his philosophical studies from Darsana institute of philosophy. Following his graduation, he completed his theological studies from Samanvaya Theology College. He was ordained on 7 February 2016 at Najibabad.

As an ordained pastor of the Lord, he chose the less trodden paths and pioneered to be a frontier minister of the Lord. Thus he took up various frontier missions in different mission lands of India like Prem Dam, a home for the physically and mentally challenged at Najibabad, Bosco Mane, Bangalore and Kutch Vikas Trust, Gujarat. Having been enriched by frontier experience and spirituality, he proceeded to the virgin mission land of Nepal where he worked till this day, with all vigour and vitality.

Jayin (36) who was a missionary to Nepal, had come home as a delegate to the Provincial Synaxis. He was residing at the Provincial House ever since the lockdown. For the last two days he was organizing his passage to Nepal. On 12 September 2020, he had his supper with the community as usual. After the meals he suffered a massive cardiac arrest and he was rushed to St Mary's Hospital, Najibabad. The doctors at the hospital made a thorough and detailed examination. Their efforts failed to revive him. He was declared dead at 9.40 p.m.

Jayin was brought to the Provincial House, Najibabad, where he remained until the funeral rites. As the COVID-19 protocols were to be followed, and in order to prevent the place from getting crowded, religious communities around the Provincial House and priests from the diocese of Bijnor came in separately and paid their homage.

Bishop Vincent Nellaiparamapil of Bijnor, together with Bishops Emeritus Gratian Mundadan and John Vadakel led the funeral rite. Bishop John Vadakel gave the funeral homily. After the requiem, the condolence messages from Rev. Fr Thomas Chathamparampil CMI, the Prior General and His Excellency, Bishop Paul Simick of Kathmandu, Nepal were read out. We are glad that Jayin has left a practical as well as a simple legacy for all of us to follow. Jayin was interred with all his departed CMI brothers at Najibabad.



Fr. Varghese Kottor CMI (1940-2020)

Rev. Fr Varghese Kottoor (80) was man who went around making his confreres, colleagues, students, parishioners and friends simile. He was an apostle of wellness with his 'mission' of inner smile. His spiritual outlook was so contagious that he infected everyone with relaxation and made their faces beaming with smile.

Fr Varghese was born of late Shri Mathai Varkey and Elamma Varkey Kottoor on 31 July 1940 at Udayamperoor in the Archdiocese of Ernakulam-Angamaly. He made his First Profession in the CMI congregation in 1961 and was ordained priest in 1969. He did his theological studies at Dharmaram College, Bangalore.

Fr Varghese began his priestly ministry at Kalamassery, where he was in charge of the school- going young people and later opted for Bijnor Mission. With an MA in English, he enhanced the linguistic ability of both his confreres and the students in formation. In the Bijnor mission he served as the Director of the Apostolate of Education, and served the diocese of Bijnor in the capacity of the Vicar General for a long time.

It is in his stint as the Priest-in-charge of the Catholic community at Bijnor that he mentored Bl. Rani Maria, who was a member of the Franciscan Clarist community as a Junior Sister.

A man full of life and childlike innocence, he left an indelible mark on everyone he came in contact with.

He was known as the apostle of smile. The vibrant and lively nature of Fr Varghese Kottoor was enhanced by his unique apostolate of inner smile.

His final years could be spent ever more fruitfully at Masih Vidyapeeth, the Regional Philosophy College, Agra with young philosophy students of various north Indian dioceses as their Spiritual Director. While serving there, he fell ill and was brought to Ghaziabad for medical treatment. While under medical observation, he suffered a respiratory failure and passed away on 01.10.2020.

On the same day, he was brought to the Provincial House at Najibabad. Following the demands of the protocol placed by the state, in the wake of the pandemic, he was given a quiet farewell. The small community that gathered to bid him the final farewell stood in contrast to the large number of bishops, priests, religious and laity who knew him well. He was interred at St John's Provincial House Cemetery, Najibabad.



Rev. Fr. Tom Jose Verumkal CMI (1933-2020)

Rev. Fr. Tom Jose Verumkal CMI of St. John's Province, Bijnor was called for his eternal reward on 14 December 2020 at St. Joseph's Hospital, Ghaziabad at the age of 87. He was a member of CMI Sanjo Bhavan, Mariam Nagar, Ghaziabad, Uttar Pradesh. The obsequies took place at St. John's Provincial House, Najibabad at 3.30 PM attended by a modest number of priests and religious, following the protocol of the pandemic. His confreres and other religious and priests and acquaintances paid him homage in groups as is practised during the Covid-19 pandemic. Rev. Fr. Mathew Thenamkalayil CMI, the Prefect of the Provincial House initiated the funeral services while Bishop Vincent Nellaiparambil of Bijnor Diocese presided over the Eucharistic celebration with the Provincial and the Councillors, in which Bishop Emeritus John Vadakel CMI of Bijnor Diocese paid fitting

tributes to the unassuming, dedicated and jovial pioneer missionary of Bijnor Mission. Fr. Benny Thettayil CMI, the Provincial Superior interred the mortal remains of Fr. Tom Jose in the cemetery on the premises of the Provincial House in the presence of a moderate gathering of his confreres and missionaries.

Fr. Tom Jose was born on 20 September 1933 at Kudayathoor parish of Pala Diocese. He joined the Sacred Heart Aspirants' House, Aluva in 1957 after his pre-degree studies at Sacred Heart College, Thevara. He made his first profession on 16 May 1960 at Christ the King Novitiate, Karukutty. After his studies at Dharmaram College, Bangalore, he was ordained priest on 17 May 1966. His first appointment was at Sacred Heart Monastery, Thevara and was given the charge of the farm in Kakkanad where the Rajagiri College of Engineering and Social Sciences is established. His effective management of the farm paved him the way to the estate at Niravilpuzha.

In 1973, Fr Tom Jose came to Bijnor Mission and began to work as a pioneer missionary in the infant mission. Initially, he served at the mission stations of Bijnor, Padampur and Kalagargh for a short stint before he was entrusted with the assignment of launching a new mission at Pauri, which is the district headquarters of Pauri-Garhwal. Short in stature but proficient in the local language, he found his own method of acquaintance with the people. Not waiting to be greeted, he greeted people on the way with a few words in Garhwali, the local dialect, and saluted the bus and truck drivers. Generally, they returned the salutation the following day and thus he made a good rapport with the people. In those

days, 'like the tents of the shepherds' (Is 38:12), he moved from one rented residence to another. He walked the Himalayan terrain visiting villages. The more he walked the more he established contacts with the people. Having established the first mission station in the Garhwal Himalaya complete with a presbytery, convent and school, he moved to Lansdowne, another hill station in the Bijnor Mission. Subsequently, he served at the missions of Chandpur, Nagina, Satpuli, Srinagar and Anugrahalayam, the transit house of Bijnor Province, at Aluva.

While at Aluva, Fr Tom Jose was available to the retreat centres around Kochi and Trissur for confessions any time of the day until his health deteriorated. Gradually, he was moved to Sanjo Bhavan, Ghaziabad where medical care was available nearby. With malice towards none and love for all, Fr. Tom Jose cracked jokes, told stories and recited old poems to enthuse the visitors, never complaining of any discomfort of his illness or inconveniences of age. His 'contented life was a continual festival' (Prov 15:15). His presence in the community was a joy for all members, the neighbours and visitors, reminding them "How good, how delightful it is for all to live like brothers" (Ps. 133:1).

Fr. Tom Jose was a jovial religious who lived his life joyfully. Everyone who came in contact with him remembered him fondly. He was a person who enjoyed community life. He was known for his terse humour and joyfully he got along with the younger members of the community, who made him reminisce his youthful days; this he enjoyed thoroughly. His characteristic joy was visible even towards the end of his days. Even while he was under medication and was battling for his life in the Intensive Care Unit, he sang one of his poems and gladdened the otherwise monotonous life of the nurses and other staff of the unit. He lived a life that was full and met his end well.


Brothers' Achievements

JEEVAN DHARA ASHRAM, JAIHARIKHAL, UK

Father John Chakkanatt CMI

I am happy to observe that Jeevan Dhara Ashram, Jaiharikhal, although it is perhaps the humblest of our houses with minimum investment of finance and personnel, deserves the pride of place in the province. This is the 21st year since we accepted from the diocese the responsibility of its running. We should appreciate that all these years the Ashram has remained as a *bes-rauma* and *puṇya-saṃketam*, maintaining the atmosphere of silence, solitude and prayer coupled with the ideals of ashram life such as openness, simplicity, and the love of God, neighbour and nature. This is attested by the reports of canonical visitation by the provincials one after another. For example the latest one dated 27 February 2020 reads: "...It is edifying that the members come together for community prayers every day...There is a good rapport between them, and their simplicity is remarkable...The chronicle is properly written,... the Ashram surroundings are kept clean and tidy. I greatly appreciate the spiritual service given to many...the occasional *satsangs* with the participation of local people are highly appreciated."



It is worth mentioning that for the past more than three years they are using the English version of the *Liturgy of Hours* of the Syro-Malabar Church. Not yet familiar with the tunes of hymns, they rather chant them. Each session of the prayer takes only 20 minutes on an average. All the participants, including the visitors of different Rites and languages, find it practical and meaningful, although there is room for improvement. They hope that with the passage of time it will be still more beautiful. It may be good that we try it in all our communities.


Regarding the financial matters, they continue to meet the ordinary expenses with the donation from the visiting $s\bar{a}dhakas$ and the remuneration for the off-campus ministries by the members. During the previous provincial term, however, the income from these sources being comparatively less, they

received from the provincial funds an extra allowance of nearly Rs 1,50,000.00 per year. This is in addition to Rs 2,90,000.00 that the province spent there for some repair and maintenance work and the improvement of gardens during the same period.

The major expense is the salary for the domestic staff. There are two of them, Mr Sony Briju and Mr Sunil Kumar, both from the far off village of Ghat in Chamoli district. They have been serving the Ashram faithfully for the past 15 or more years. They are paid, including the full board and lodgings, and the bank- savings of Rs 15,000.00 and Rs 14,725.00 respectively per month; and they get one month's annual leave with payment, and casual leaves as required for urgent reasons. With the generous help of our Provincial Department for Social Apostolate the Ashram also meets the expenses for their children's education, the medical care of theirs and the family members and the repair and maintenance of their houses. They are also welcome to participate in the prayer programmes, especially the daily Marian Rosary. They are happy and grateful for the help they receive.

The Ashram community provides the *sādhakas* with spirituality courses, retreats, personal guidance and library facilities. Of late they take more care that the courses and retreats are conducted by all the resident members, jointly as a team. They also

accept requests for pastoral ministries elsewhere, without interference with the Ashram schedule. Fr Mathew Valiakandathil's retreats and prayer programmes for the faithful in the mission stations are well appreciated. Fr Tom Mundadan renders his expert assistance to our schools for scientifically setting up the libraries; he also occasionally goes to give retreats and courses to religious groups. Acharya Thomas usually spends the winter months for giving courses and retreats in different formation centres. Father Mathew's characteristic ease and charisma in dealing with the common people is very helpful in maintaining good relations with the neighbourhood. His friendly visits to the families, especially when they are in some need or difficulty, evince his pastoral spirit. The occasional *sat*-



sangs/bhajan-mandalis that he conducts are well attended by people irrespective of caste and creed, especially the womenfolk. The Ashram also has good understanding and cooperation with the parish community of Lansdowne, including the priests-in-charge, the religious sisters and a few floating lay-faithful. There are occasions of their get-togethers for some simple celebrations, sharing of ideas and experiences and spiritual help like confession and guidance. They also enjoy joint celebrations of events like the Holy Week services, sometimes in the Ashram Mandir and other times in the Parish Church.

There is no doubt that people, though not numerically so big, do benefit from the ashram ministry. This is testified by the fact that most of the $s\bar{a}dhakas$ while leaving the Ashram express their desire to return, and in fact many do return and some do so repeatedly on a regular basis! This is, therefore, a mission that we must by all means continue. What is most required for it is that at least a few of us venture and are encouraged to venture into the ashram style of life—it is indeed more a matter of life than performance. The present Acharya feels it is high time that someone else took over from him the responsibility of heading the Ashram, while he would be happy to continue his stay there, offering all possible help, if needed.

HEROES OF THE TIMES

We meet celebrities in life. Through their physical, artistic talents or their positions in the society they climb the ladder of fame. One cannot easily get the fame of celebrities. Though we cannot reach such enviable positions in the society anybody can be noble and honest and can get over the meanness of character. Whenever we try to be human in complex and trying situation we exhibit the noble caliber of our character; we become simply human.

These times of Covid we could meet few such characters. They encourage us in our struggle of life.

It is the Matrubhumi daily which brought out the person of Steffy Simon. She is a staff nurse of Vandanam Medical College at Alappuzha. During the course of her duty she found a Covid-19 patient with a state of mental imbalance. He was not eating properly and regularly and looked hungry and famished. Steffy took the risk of feeding him with her own hands when many fear to venture out for fear of contracting the virus. Steffy is a shining example of heroism.

More touching is the heroism of an ambulance driver, Aarif Khan, who sacrificed his life on the altar of Covid-19 at a youthful age of 48. Indian Express New Delhi edition on 11th October, 2020 brought out his story amazing as it is. He was an ambulance driver employed with Shahid Bhagat Singh Seva Dal, which provides free emergency services in the Capital. He was ready to part with the paltry sum he had for his upkeep, for the family in need to do the last rites for the deceased member of the family. He was on duty 24x7. He saw that others get a decent burial but his family couldn't attend his own burial. He was attending the duties without taking any leave the whole period of Covid season. He himself died infected with the same disease. The family bid farewell to him from afar for few minutes.

In our own Congregation we find few people courageously took up the challenge of their ministry in spite of the threat of infection by the disease. Fr. Justin Akkara CMI, the provincial of Bhopal Province has gone out with a team of forty volunteers to identify the people and infected containment zones or the possibility of the infection by the Corona Virus at the request of the civil authorities. They were very much supported by the Archbishop Leo Cornalius of Bhopal.

So also we have the courageous example of Fr. Thomas Kalampatt CMI, in America, who by sheer dint of his spiritual vigor took up the duty of sacramental administration to the dying Covid-19 patients. It was reported by Fr. Davis Kavunkal CMI. Let us greet these gallant frontline soldiers who fought a heroic war against the threat of this Pandemic.



VOCATION, FORMATION AND PROMOTION: JUST FOR REFLECTION

Recently a young religious sister told a priest in a pathetic mood that almost five youngsters left their congregation. The priest told her that they might have left the community not because religious life is bad or difficult but because most probably they could not find love in the community. Nobody will leave a community where he/she feels that he/she is loved and wanted. As a community of men religious we the CMIs have to ask ourselves how can I promote vocations and sustain the vocation of others in the community. Do I own my brother in the community? Sometimes the younger generations in our communities lament "nobody owns us." But in some other CMI communities the youngsters expressed the joy that they are people that are wanted by the province. We can lose our vocation not only when we leave a community but living in the community we can lead a life of lost vocation. Youngsters are to be corrected but they also must be encouraged. Many youngsters suffer humiliation sometimes to the extent of exploding within themselves. Priests want to get all the services of the seminarians but at their real or imaginary failures they are thrashed left and right; all in the name of formation and discipline. No formation happens in this type of disciplinary hypocrisy. Team Mathew Pedikkat with powerful assistance from youthful Gijo Mavely and Phinil is trying their level best in promoting vocation in the grass root phase in Kerala. Let us, elderly people, try to own our younger generation encouraging and promoting their vocation in a tangible manner.
